



2016 Library Spaces Survey: Summary of Results

Purpose

To collect feedback regarding the revitalization of physical library spaces across all University of Saskatchewan (U of S) libraries to continue to meet the changing needs of the campus community and help shape the library's future.

Methodology

A random sample of 8,793 U of S students, faculty, and staff received an email invitation to complete an online survey on September 19, 2016. This sample represented approximately 30% of students and 40% of faculty and staff.

The survey was open for a 3-week period with two email reminders sent to participants who had not yet completed the survey. All participants had the option to enter a draw to win an iPad Air 2 or one of four \$25 gift cards.

A total of 2,662 people completed the survey for a response rate of 30.3%.

Survey

- The survey asked questions about 5 categories of library spaces (listed below) including whether or not respondents would use these spaces if available at one or more University of Saskatchewan (U of S) libraries
 1. Core library spaces
 2. Spaces for study
 3. Technology enhanced spaces
 4. Creative spaces
 5. Additional spaces
- Respondents then provided a ranking of the 3 most important library spaces (within each category) to include in U of S libraries moving forward. A list of spaces included within each category can be found in the appendix.
- Respondents were also asked to rank the top 5 most important new library spaces (out of 15 new library spaces) included in the last three categories

Demographics

- Of the respondents who completed the survey, 61.6% were undergraduate students, 15.4% graduate students, 14.7% staff, and 4.9% faculty
- 41.2% of undergraduate and graduate student respondents indicated Arts and Science as their college/area of study followed by 9.6% for Engineering and 8.2% for Agriculture and Bioresources
- A total of 67.2% of respondents reported visiting one or more of the U of S libraries at least weekly (including 31.0% who visited daily); another 12.6% visited monthly
- Over half of respondents (53.9%) visited the Murray Library most often followed by the Leslie and Irene Dubé Health Sciences Library (20.6%)

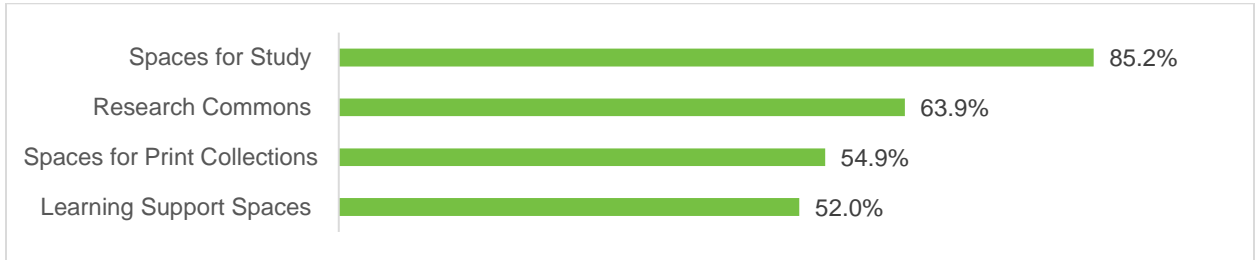

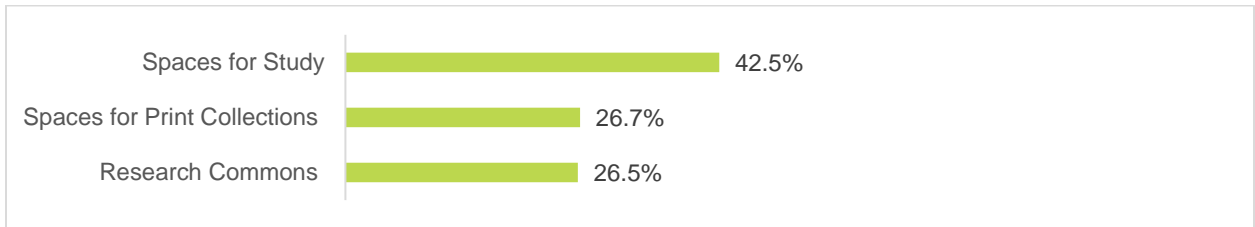


Core Library Spaces:

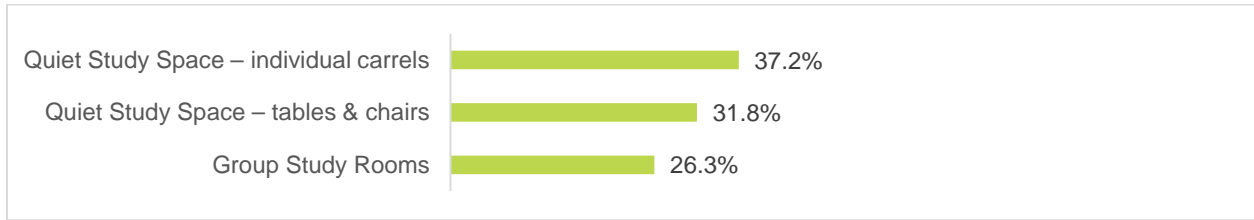

Top 3 most important spaces for study to include in U of S libraries moving forward

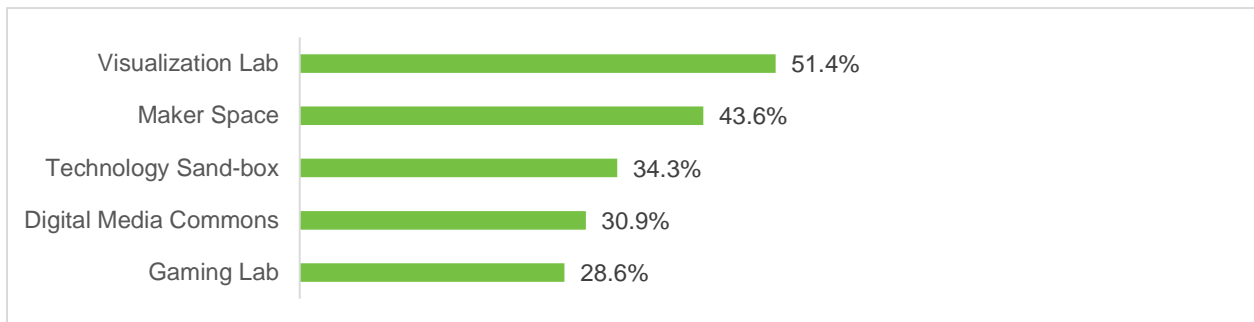

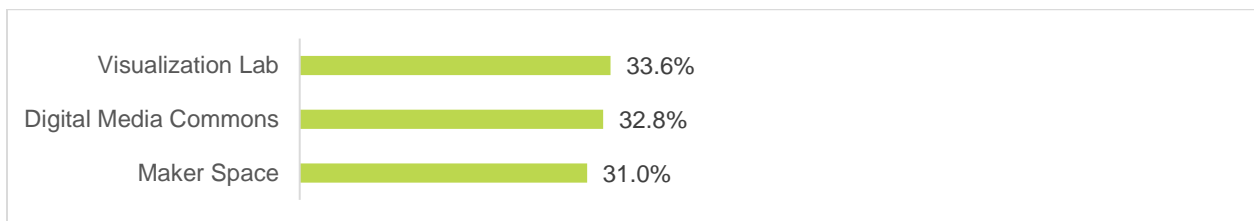

Top 3 most important technology enhanced spaces to include in U of S libraries moving forward



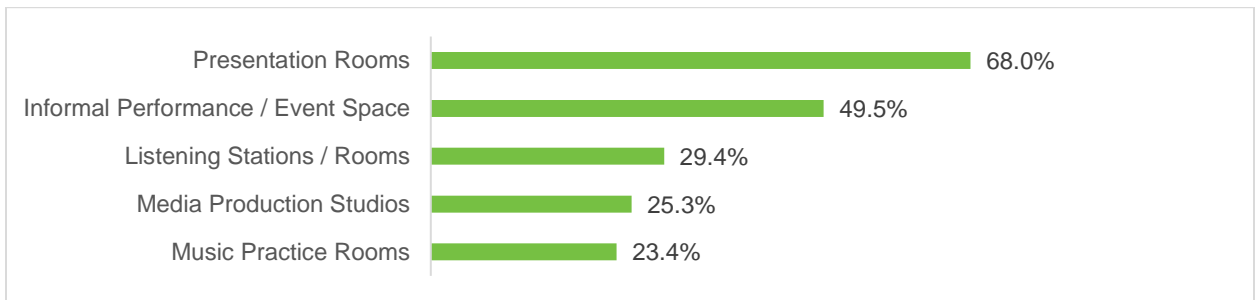

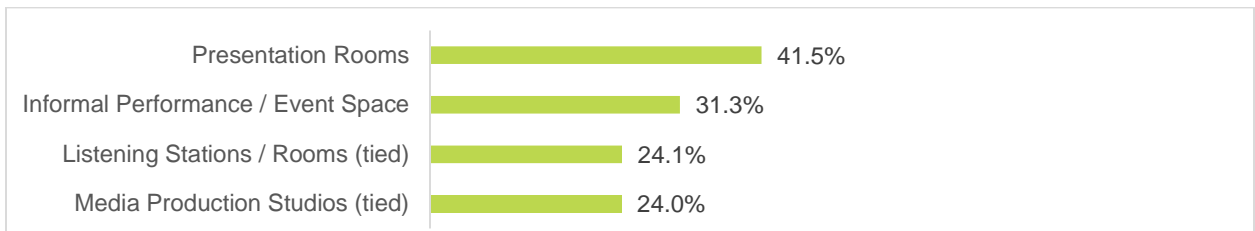

Top 3 most important creative spaces to include in U of S libraries moving forward



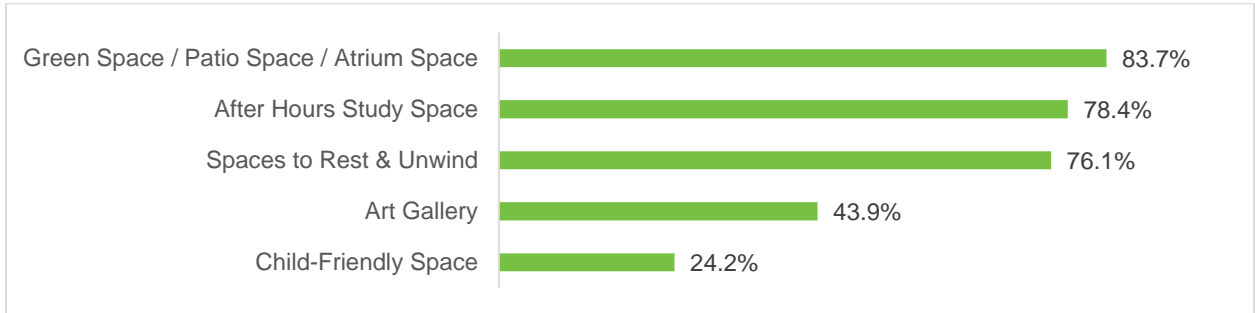

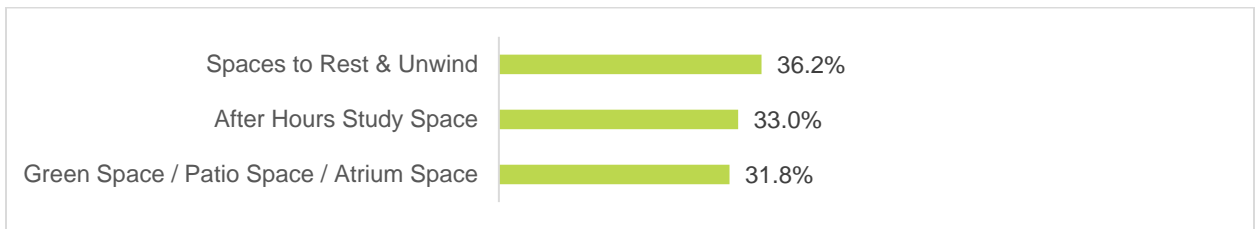

Top 3 most important additional spaces to include in U of S libraries moving forward

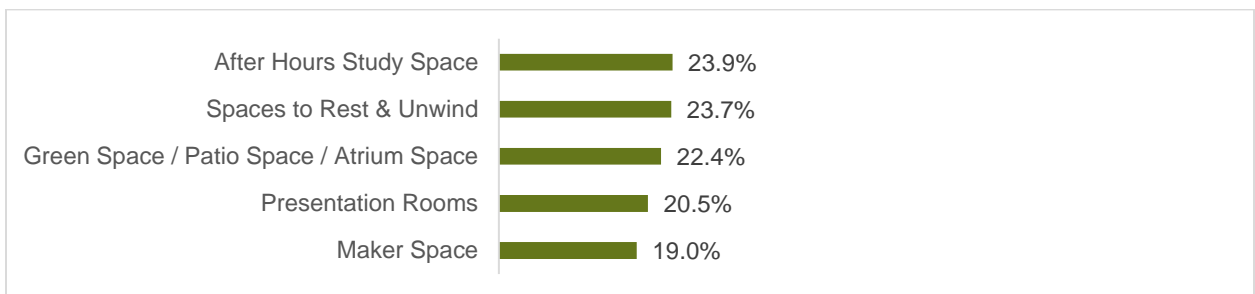

Appendix

Core Library Spaces:

- Spaces for Study (e.g. quiet study space, common study areas, group study rooms)
- Research Commons (e.g. collaborative work space, research support)
- Spaces for Print Collections (e.g. books, journals)
- Learning Support Spaces (e.g. math help, writing help)

Spaces for Study:

- Quiet Study Space – tables & chairs
- Quiet Study Space – individual carrels
- Common Study Area – tables & chairs
- Common Study Area – lounge seating
- Group Study Rooms
- Individual Computer Stations

Technology Enhanced Spaces:

- Digital Media Commons (space and technology to support the creation of new digital media forms such as animation, soundscapes, graphic design, and digital video)
- Gaming Lab (space that supports the scholarly study of digital games, and also provides a place for students to take a break and play games for fun)
- Maker Space (a DIY space often including hands-on tools such 3D printers, software, electronics, craft and hardware supplies)
- Technology Sand-box (interdisciplinary computing facility for collaborative research for exploring new interactive technologies)
- Visualization Lab (space that offers room-sized immersive display for visualizations and simulations)

Creative Spaces:

- Presentation Rooms (technology enhanced spaces with equipment to support variety of presentation media)
- Music Practice Rooms (sound proof space designed to support individual and small group practices)
- Listening Stations / Rooms (space for listening to audio recordings (e.g. for music, linguistics, language, drama), with appropriate equipment to support the listening of a variety of audio formats)
- Media Production Studios (space providing equipment needed to create, record, edit and produce videos, music, etc.)
- Informal Performance / Event Space (an informal setting for music, drama, spoken poetry, dance, readings; space that could also be used for public events, gatherings)



Additional Spaces:

- Spaces to rest & unwind – can include, but not limited to; furniture geared towards resting such as sleep pods, spaces for contemplation and reflection rather than active studying, areas for activities such as yoga or therapy dogs
- Green space / patio space / atrium space – areas that connect the indoors with the outdoors, such as outdoor patios or spaces with a lot of greenery
- Art Gallery – gallery space that highlights works produced by university students/staff/faculty and/or university art collections; this space could include an experiential component for students to practice the art of curation
- After hours study space – safe, secure space that allows for extended study outside of regular library service hours
- Child-friendly space – space where children are welcome to come with their parent/guardian, potentially with child-friendly furniture and resources; child-care services are not envisioned in this term
